Announcement concerning Final Examinations and Spring Convocation 1982: 1. Increasing enrolments and more extensive use of formal final examinations in many courses has resulted in scheduling difficulties for the conflict-free examination timetable. 2. This new situation coupled with the desire of the University to maintain a Convocation schedule which starts the first Saturday of June means that changes in examination scheduling are required.

The changes that will be introduced this April are as follows: 3.

a) The first day of examination for the Faculties of Arts, Education and Fine Arts will be Friday, April 16, 1982 (not Monday, April 19 as mentioned in the Undergraduate Programs Calendar.

ь) Every attempt will be made to schedule all examinations in 34 periods which will include: i) 3 periods on each of Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday
 ii) 2 periods on each of Friday and Saturday

concluding most or all examinations by Friday, April 30, 1982. c) The periods each day will be: 8:30 a.m.-11:30 a.m.; 1:00 p.m.-4:00 p.m.; 5:30 p.m.-8:30

p.m., Monday through Thursday only.
4. The Faculty of Science will start their examination schedule on Monday, April 12, 1982.
Consistent with existing University policy, no examinations will be scheduled on Passover (Wednesday and Thursday, April 14 and 15).

There will be no change in the convention regarding consecutive examinations. Normally 5. students will not be asked to write more than two examinations in a row (excluding weekends). 6. Authority for these changes may be found in the minutes of the November 3, 1981, Policy Committee meeting.

The relevant quotation is as follows: "Where an educational institution provides for tuition to an employee or to his spouse or children, the fair market value of the benefit will be included in the employee's income. However, where the benefit is in respect of the employee's own tuition he is entitled to a deduction for tuition. The employee is not entitled to any such deduction in respect of tuition provided to a dependent but the latter may be entitled to the deduction." As such tuition fees for 1981 will be reflected as a taxable benefit on T4 slips in box K, and the Tuition Fees Income Tax receipt will be issued in the student's name. The value will be calculated as follows:
