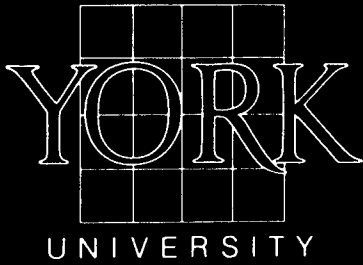

REPORT TO THE YORK UNIVERSITY COMMUNITY

PROGRESS REPORT ON NEGOTIATIONS WITH YUFA

Mediation sessions in the current round of negotiations between YUFA and the York University administration were held on Thursday, April 29, Friday April 30, and Sunday, May 2, 1982.

During mediation, the administration improved its previous offer to YUFA to a total of just over 13%. YUFA then broke off negotiations.

The salaries increments for YUFA would be distributed as an across-the-board increment of 10.1% and a career progress increment of \$1002 for all continuing bargaining unit members. The Administration also proposed updating the Dental Plan fees schedule to 1981, and confirmed its offer of other non-salaries cost items equivalent to .1%. During mediation, the administration modified substantially proposals it had made previously with respect to summer teaching assignments, and reiterated previous offers made with respect to retirement, voluntary separation, daycare support, minor research funding, and YUFA officers' release-time.

YUFA's response to the administration offer has been to remain largely silent on non-monetary issues, and to press for salary and benefits increases totalling 15.2% and non-salary cost items of a further .4%. YUFA has continued demands with respect to retirements, contractually limited appointments, and class size which would interfere seriously with the University's ability to respond to needs for academic development and renewal, and to the continuing pressures of inadequate financing.

The administration's negotiating committee has tried hard to effect a settlement which makes sense for York University's needs and finances, which does not give to YUFA a disproportionate share of the funds available for salary increments for all York employees, and which is entirely respectable in the context of today's employment market and economy. The committee could have offered -- and still would offer -- a small amount more for a settlement. Unfortunately, what we could offer did not appear sufficient to satisfy YUFA's demands. The negotiating committee does not have the latitude to move to the level of settlement being asked for by YUFA, both the University Policy Committee and the Board of Governors having decided that it would be irresponsible to ignore the pressing needs of programs for funds to cope with enrolment growth, inflation, and the need for adequate support services.

YUFA has indicated that it may undertake "Job Action" in support of its demands. YUFA bargaining unit members who engage in such action will be on strike, and will not receive pay for the period of their strike. The administration is writing to each member of the YUFA unit, making this position clear, and indicating that, given the nature of most faculty duties at this time of year, in order to be paid an individual must fulfil all normal responsibilities and file with the administration a statement that he/she is doing so.

It is our sincere hope that any disruption of the work of the University which may be caused by those YUFA-unit employees who exercise their legal right to strike will be short-lived, and that the union will return to mediation to settle at a figure which York University as a whole can afford.

PROGRESS REPORT ON NEGOTIATIONS WITH YUFA

This report has been prepared in order to bring members of the York University community up to date on the current state of negotiations with YUFA, and to indicate the support of York's President, Vice-Presidents, and Deans for the position which has been taken by the administration's Negotiating Committee. In order to ensure receipt of this report by employees not regularly on campus at this time of year, copies are being sent to home addresses as well.

At a negotiating session on May 7, 1982, the administration's Negotiating Committee improved the offer which had previously been made to YUFA, and which had been found unacceptable by a YUFA general meeting on May 3, 1982. The financial offer was increased past the previous 13% level to 13.35%:

10.3% across-the-board (up from 10.1%)

PLUS \$1004. Career Progress Increments for all continuing members

PLUS 1982 Dental Plan fee schedule (up .15% from previous offer)

Funds were also offered for YUFA release-time, Minor Research Funding, and Daycare Centre support. The administration dropped entirely its proposals for changes to the existing clauses on summer teaching assignments.

These moves were made in an attempt to break the impasse which had developed. It was our expectation that the membership of the bargaining unit would have an opportunity to express its views on this offer through a ratification vote, and we regret that that opportunity has yet to be extended.

The offer which has been made to YUFA is, in our view, an entirely reasonable one, fair in the context of the present economic climate, well above levels of increments being awarded in the community generally, and consistent with York's financial situation and academic needs. The York community has been given a good deal of information on the University's financial circumstances. In both 1980-81 and 1981-82 there have been substantial deficits, repayment of which must now begin. The discounted slip-year grants associated with enrolment growth in 1981-82 allow us to begin that repayment in 1982-83, to meet some of the most pressing academic program and support needs identified by Senate (e.g. support for Libraries and academic computing), to offer salary increments of the magnitude already proposed to YUFA, and to do so without additional budget cuts to programs and activities in 1982-83.

Applications for the coming year indicate another substantial increase in enrolments, but under our funding system, in 1982-83 the University will have only the additional fees generated by the new students. This additional revenue has to be committed to meet the additional costs of teaching and providing essential support services to the new students. Many of you are directly involved in the planning for additional sections and the selection of part-time faculty and Teaching Assistants to cope with the increased enrolments. The University considers it to be socially responsible and advantageous to York in the longer run to accept the enrolment growth, but in 1982-83 there is no net financial advantage.

We hope that York's faculty members and professional librarians, and the YUFA Committees which represent them, will understand that available resources must provide not only for salary increments, but also for adequate support of teaching and research needs. We believe that the University's current budget plan achieves this end while permitting a salary offer of 13.35% to YUFA, an offer which we consider to be reasonable, sensible and fair for York University. We hope that YUFA's Negotiating and Executive Committees can support a settlement in this context.

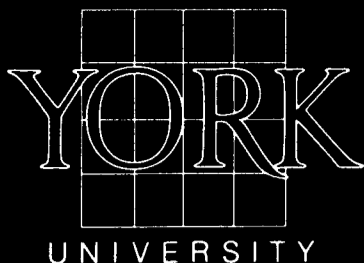
