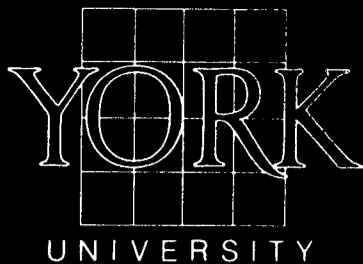

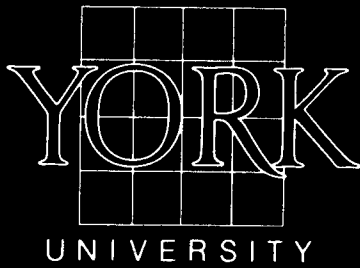

A Rhodes Scholarship is forfeited by marriage after election, or during a scholar's first year of residence; have been born between October 2, 1958 and October 1, 1964; have completed at least three years of university training by October 1, 1983. Further information and application forms may be obtained from University registrar, from the office of the General Secretary for the Rhodes Scholarships in Canada (P.O. Box 48, Toronto-Dominion Centre, Toronto M5K 1E6 (362-1812), or from the Provincial Secretaries.
