GENERAL

- * SNOW EMERGENCY: Members of the community at the York Campus are advised that when a snow emergency is declared by Metropolitan Toronto or when it is apparent that weather conditions at the University are such as to necessitate snow clearance on the roads and in the parking lots, the following restrictions on parking will be imposed in order to facilitate snow removal:
 - (1) curbside parking will not be permitted in the peripheral (unreserved) lots;
 - (2) between midnight and 8:00 a.m. no parking will be permitted on any campus roads including those where parking is normally allowed (e.g. Ottawa Road and the road adjacent to the Temporary Office Building)**; and
 - (3) between midnight and 8:00 a.m. no parking will be permitted in any reserved area (excluding HH lot)**.

(Note: **The University reserves the right to suspend parking temporarily in any area for emergencies; York Campus Parking and Traffic Regulations 1982/83). The above measures are necessary to facilitate the most efficient use of snow removal equipment to ensure that roads and parking lots are properly cleared before the commencement of classes in the morning. The degree of co-operation and good judgement shown by all members of the community, especially those in residence who park overnight on campus, will determine the effectiveness of the snow removal programme, which is of importance to all drivers on campus.

- * York University employees are reminded that copies of the 1983 "TD 1 Personal Income Tax Exemption Form" have been distributed to all departments for completion. As stated on the TD 1: "This return need not be filed by employees claiming the Basic Personal Exemption only. If you do not file this return, as required, income tax will be deducted as though you were a single person without dependents." Therefore, if you do not wish to be taxed as single, the TD 1 must be returned to the Payroll Department, Room B42, Temporary Office Building, no later than Friday, January 7, 1983 to ensure correct taxing for January.

- * Applications for the 1983 Ontario-Quebec Exchange Program will be accepted until January 31, 1983. The object of the program is to facilitate bilateral exchanges and cooperation between faculty, staff and students. Acceptable projects include cooperation and joint research projects for professors and researchers, who want to collaborate with faculty members in the corresponding department of a Quebec University, or to undertake a joint research project; and, education exchanges between members of the faculty to teach courses in a university of the other province. This comprises exchanges of members of the faculty and staff for professional development purposes; students registered full-time in an Ontario university who wish to attend a full program of credit courses for one or two semesters in a Quebec university; members of the faculty to study methods of second-language teaching; groups of students for visits involving participation in educational, cultural and linguistic activities at the host institution; and, brief one or two-day visits by one or two persons to a university institution in the other province for the planning of an exchange project. The projects will be analysed by a selection committee composed of representatives of both governments, according to set criteria. They will be responsible for the regular monitoring of all laboratories in which radioactive materials are used, for giving advice and assistance in any emergencies involving radioactive materials, for the provision of radiation badges, for the coordination of procurement, storage and disposal of radioactive materials, for providing a consultative service and for ensuring that operations at the University involving radioactive materials are conducted in accordance with the terms of the consolidated licence granted to the University by the Atomic Energy Control Board. They will also be responsible for ensuring that operations involving x-ray sources are conducted in accordance with the terms of Regulation 721 of the Public Health Act of Ontario and that all operations at the University involving potentially harmful radiation are conducted in accordance with the York University "Regulations for the protection of persons working with and exposed to potentially harmful radiation."

- * SNOW EMERGENCY: Members of the community at the York campus are advised that when a Snow Emergency is declared by Metropolitan Toronto or when it is apparent that weather conditions at the University are such as to necessitate snow clearance on the roads and in the parking lots, the following restrictions on parking will be imposed in order to facilitate snow removal:
 - 1) curb parking will not be permitted in the peripheral (unreserved) lots;
 - 2) between midnight and 8:00 a.m., no parking will be permitted on any campus roads including those where parking is normally allowed (e.g. Ottawa Road and the road adjacent to the Temporary Office Building*); and,
 - 3) between midnight and 8:00 a.m., no parking will be permitted in any reserved area (excluding HH lot)*.

*NOTE: The University reserves the right to suspend parking temporarily in any area for emergencies as per York Campus Parking and Traffic Regulations 1982/83.
The above measures are necessary to facilitate the most efficient use of snow removal equipment to ensure that roads and parking lots are properly cleared before the commencement of classes in the morning. The degree of cooperation and good judgement shown by all members of the community, especially those in residence who park overnight on campus, will determine the effectiveness of the snow removal program, which is of importance to all drivers on campus.

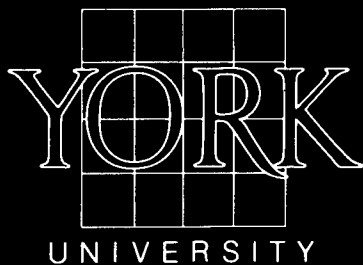
