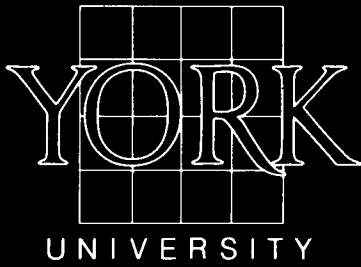

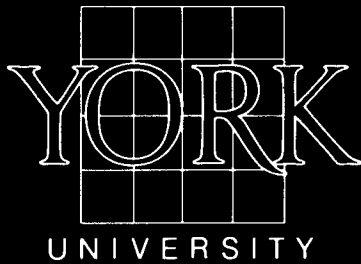

President's Special Review Committee

Preliminary Report

This Committee was established by the President of York University on Monday, April 18th to report immediately on the current situation of Ms. Janice Joseph and the state of her immediate safety; on the incident of April 8th and the support being provided to those York students involved; on the Police incident of April 13th and the support being provided to the York student involved in that incident. Further, the Committee was charged to assess the state of affairs on this campus with respect to racial tolerance or intolerance of our many minorities; to review, for clarity and effect, York University's stated policy on racial and religious intolerance; to examine procedures at York (particularly in York Housing and York Security) to see if they are properly organized to handle current tensions and enforce our policy of tolerance and to ensure that the process for dealing with complaints at York is complete and fair to all parties; and, finally, to examine the relationship between the University and the municipal police, and, if necessary, recommend mechanisms that will allow the university to receive prompt service from the police when necessary, but which can ensure that the University is made routinely aware of Metro Police activities on campus and in a position to review the character of those activities. In addition, the Committee understands that its mandate includes the monitoring of the upcoming Disciplinary Hearing convened to investigate and act upon Ms. Joseph's complaints against Mr. Austin.

This nine member committee of Mr. Terry Conlin, Mr. Le Roy Cox, Mr. Tawia Hayford, Mrs. Elspeth Heyworth (Chair), Ms. Teresa Hibbert, Ms. Kay Maharaj, Master Wallace Northover, Professor Ato Sekyi-Otu and Professor J. Stuckey, was called to its first meeting on Tuesday, April 19, 1983 and has met together on six occasions.

The Committee's first concern was to address Ms. Janice Joseph's immediate safety and security and her lawful right to live in peace in her apartment. To this end the following action has been taken:

1. At the request of the Committee, the President has directed that a 24-hour security guard be posted by the door of Ms. Joseph's apartment to look after her well-being. This directive was implemented on Thursday, April 21st and will remain in effect as long as necessary.
2. This Committee and the Administration have lost faith in Mr. Austin's assurances that he will be absent from campus until the week of May 9th. Because of this and the tensions created by Mr. Austin's presence on campus, it was decided that direct action was required to prohibit Mr. Austin from his apartment in the graduate residences. This direct action involved changing the lock on Mr. Austin's apartment door and removing his property from his apartment to a professional storage area off campus. It is intended that this removal will protect the personal safety of Ms. Joseph and Mr. Austin, as well as protecting the property of Mr. Austin. A letter has been sent to Mr. Austin informing him of this action.
3. Ms. Joseph had decided to move from her apartment at 8 Assiniboine Road and York Housing had agreed to make available another apartment for her. As a result of the 24-hour guard provided by York Security, Ms. Joseph felt it was no longer necessary for her to move. York Housing has assisted Ms. Joseph to maintain her present apartment and has agreed to waive the costs associated with the leasing arrangements which Ms. Joseph subsequently decided to cancel.
4. Mr. Macdonald has written to Mr. Grant Austin requiring him to report to York Security immediately upon his return to the campus.

The Committee has initiated the information gathering task assigned to it and, to date, has had preliminary meetings with Mr. George Dunn, Director of Safety and Security Services; Mr. Norman Crandles, Manager of Housing and Food Services; Mr. John Becker, Assistant Vice-President (Student Relations); and Mr. John Brown, a lawyer from the firm of McCarthy and McCarthy. 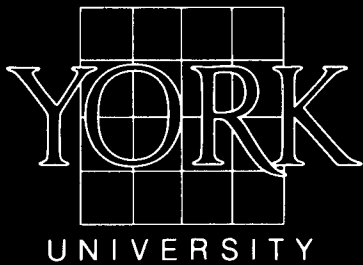
Other individuals have been invited to appear before the Committee or send in written statements.

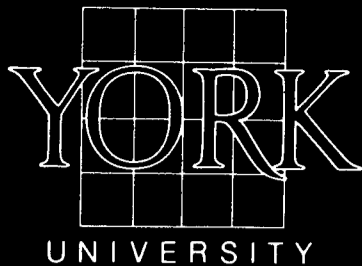

A number of visa students are currently occupying the hallway outside the President's Office on the 9th floor of the Ross Building.

The group is protesting a large increase in fees for foreign students who entered the Ontario system in 1982-83. The increase in tuition is presumed in the provincial government's formula and has been counted on as income in York University's budget planning for 1983-84.

The students had met previously with the Board of Governors Student Relations Committee to discuss their concerns and register their complaint that they had not been adequately advised of the scheduled increases.

The Board Committee went into this matter in some depth and concluded that the students had been properly notified of the impending increases. There was concern, nonetheless, that some students might not have realized the extent of the increase planned for 1983-84. In order to provide some alleviation of the burden of the fees increase, it was proposed to have bursary funds available to foreign students increased from \$5,000 to \$50,000.

The matter was further considered and discussed at the May 9th meeting of the Board of Governors and the bursary proposal approved.

A group of students met for three hours with the Board Chairman, the President and the Chairman of the Board Student Relations Committee on May 16th to express dissatisfaction with the Board's response to their concerns. At the meeting, it was agreed that the Student Relations Committee would meet again to review the issue, and would report on the matter to the June meeting of the Board.

On Tuesday, May 24th, a delegation of the Foreign Students currently occupying the hallway outside the President's Office on the 9th floor of the Ross Building was invited to the University Policy Committee Meeting to present their views on the increase in fees for new VISA students who entered the Ontario university system in 1982-83.

(The VISA students had previously met with the Board of Governors Student Relations Committee on April 18th and had another meeting with the Chairman of the Board of Governors and the President on May 16th.)

Several questions and concerns were raised at the University Policy Committee, some of which are outlined below:

1) What has been and is now York University's position on higher fees for foreign students?

From the Provincial Government's first suggestion that such a policy be adopted, no university has more vigorously opposed it than York. Not only has the institution opposed the idea of differential fees for VISA students in presentations to such bodies as the Ontario Council of University Affairs, the Council of Ontario Universities and the Association of Universities and Colleges in Canada, but President Macdonald, in numerous public speeches and many comments in the media, has described differential fees as both discriminatory and not in the long-term interests of Canada.

2) Did the Government accept York's position...or indeed that of any of the many other universities or bodies that took such a position?

No. The decision to have higher fees for foreign students was made by the Provincial Cabinet. And while it did not make it mandatory for the universities to actually impose such fees, the fact that Provincial funding of the institutions is based on the collection of VISA student fees has made it financially impossible for any of them not to do so to any significant degree.

3) What are the financial implications for York of this Government decision?

Full fees must be paid to the Provincial Government for all VISA students registered whether they are collected by a university or not. These are put into a 'pool' and then redistributed back to the universities...but not on the basis of the number of VISA students each institution has, but on the basis of its total student enrolment. Therefore, a university with a higher number of VISA students than the average will receive back proportionately less per student than institutions with a lower percentage of VISA students. York University had the second largest number of VISA students in the province (after the University of Toronto). For York not to collect these fees would certainly undercut the University's position that it is already severely underfunded.

As we, and other independent bodies, have previously pointed out in several submissions to Government, the universities of Ontario are all underfunded. Further, we have documented that York is more severely underfunded in comparison to our sister institutions. To continue to deliver high-quality programs we simply must have adequate funds. We already are carrying a large deficit and have no established funds to fall back on so we are concerned about our continuing ability to maintain our programs.

4) What is York's record in keeping with its stated philosophy in welcoming and assisting foreign students?

York is one of the universities that has strenuously resisted having any quota system on VISA students. We have established very effective (and costly) English as a Second Language courses...some of which, unlike most other universities, are credit courses.

5) Were VISA students given sufficient notice of these fee changes and why were they not given figures in dollars?

The University did not know itself what the specific figures would be until March '83 so that information could not be provided to students when initial information was supplied in August '82. But in absence of specific dollar figures we did the best possible at the time to give them a clear indication of the scope of the changes about to be made: for example, that it was clear if the government carried out its funding formula as we had been forewarned then 50 per cent of the educational cost (as defined by the Government) would be charged to VISA students in '82-'83 and 67% in '83-'84.

6) How does York plan to assist VISA students with pressing financial needs?

Last year approximately \$5,000 was extended by the University to VISA students. The Board of Governors has agreed to increase available funds in '83-'84 by ten times that amount to \$50,000. In addition, the Board's Student Relations Committee has agreed to reconvene on May 31st and June 7th to consider possible ways of relieving financial pressure on individual students. A small representative group of VISA students has been invited to present their views at the May 31st meeting.

7) Would accepting bursary funds affect the VISA status of a foreign student with the Immigration Department?

It never has within the University's experience, but we have sought legal advice to confirm that it wouldn't.
