* YORK UNIVERSITY STATEMENT -- TEAR GAS INCIDENT AT YORK UNIVERSITY

Officials at York University are treating the C.S. gas incident that occurred last Thursday, February 23 at approximately 1:30 p.m., as a serious matter. The University is cooperating with the authorities in their efforts to investigate the incident which affected so many members of the University community.

Although many people were treated at the scene of the incident and over 100 individuals had to be treated at local hospitals, the University has been informed that, fortunately, no serious injury occurred. Steps are being taken to monitor this situation in order to protect the health and well-being of members of the York University community.

The C.S. gas explosion forced the evacuation of hundreds of students and staff from the Ross Building. The complete evacuation of the building was conducted in an organized manner following appropriate health and safety procedures.

The University commends the prompt attention and assistance of the firefighting, ambulance and police forces that responded to the emergency call and the additional assistance of the Toronto Transit Commission.
