

Canada Works

Funding -Flexible, depending on the project, but generally about 50% of the costs. Maximum contribution is \$325. per work-week, including \$125 for costs other than wages. Eligible Jobs

-Projects must provide three or more jobs which match skills available among local unemployed people and which would not have been created otherwise. Projects should demonstrate some impact on the local economy and provide community benefits. They should run between 3 months and 1 year. Eliqible Employees

Young Ontario Career Program

Funding -Provides a subsidy of \$2.50 per hour up to \$100 per week for between 20 and 26 weeks. -New positions which must contribute to the employee's vocational development. of at least 25 hours per week for 20 consecutive weeks. Jobs should have a possibility of continuing beyond the subsidy. Eligible Employees -Residents of Ontario between the ages of 15 and 29 who have been unemployed for at least three months. Application Period -Continuous

Ontario Career Action Program

Funding -Provides a training allowance of \$100 per week to trainees (a maximum wage which cannot be augmented by employers) for up to 16 weeks. Eligible Jobs -New positions which will provide work experience and training. Each position must occupy between 30 and 40 hours per week and have a reasonable prospect of continuing past the training period. Eligible Employees -Youth between 16 and 24, out of full-time studies for at least three months. unemployed or actively looking for their first career-related job. Application Period -Continuous

Ontario Work Study Programs

-50% of wages, which must be between \$4.50 and \$6.25 per hour to a maximum payment of \$1000 during the fall and winter terms. Eligible Jobs -Any within the university community, between 5 and 15 hours per week for a minimum of 20 weeks.
