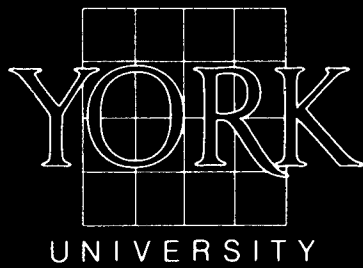

Announcement Regarding the Impact of the Papal Visit on York University, Main Campus

The Pope will be arriving in Toronto on Friday, September 14, 1984, and, among other events, will be at the Downsview Canadian Forces Base on Saturday, September 15. The Archdiocese and various municipal authorities have advised the University of the extremely heavy traffic problems that will occur around this event and have asked for York's cooperation in accommodating buses and automobiles that will be travelling to the Saturday event.

As one of the major institutions with significant parking facilities which are within reasonable distance of the site, York was asked to help with the parking. The main pressure will be felt on Saturday the 15th but undoubtedly early arrivals will appear in the City, some as early as Thursday.

Because the numbers wishing to attend the Downsview event will be far in excess of anything experienced before, many institutions and establishments are being asked to change their hours of operation and make very special arrangements so that these visitors may be adequately served. York will be participating in these arrangements and plans are now being developed which include the closing of the University (except for residential and special services) on the Saturday. This will include restrictions on the use of parking lots by York members on that day and some additional controls during the latter part of the week. Special arrangements are also being considered so that visitors and emergency service personnel may be provided with limited access to some of our buildings, et cetera.

All of our efforts will be directed toward minimizing the disruption of our normal activity during the period from September 10 to 14, but some special arrangements will be required to guard against unauthorized use of University parking.

The York community will be advised periodically as these plans are developed. It is suggested, however, that in their advance planning all departments try to limit their use of University facilities on Friday afternoon and evening, the 14th, and eliminate all classes and all but essential emergency activities and services all day on Saturday the 15th.
