PAPAL VISIT TO TORONTO - September 14-15, 1984

The York campus will be used for parking by many visitors attending the Papal Mass scheduled to take place at 3:00 p.m. on Saturday, September 15, 1984, at the Downsview Air Base. The York campus is one of the parking sites closest to the Air Base and we expect a very heavy concentration of traffic both on campus and on the streets immediately adjacent to the campus. Vehicles will not be permitted to move south of Finch Avenue after midnight on Friday, September 14, 1984.

In addition to instituting a number of measures to protect the University property and arrange for the support services for thousands of visitors, a number of other University operations will be affected. The Glendon campus, however, will not be affected by these changes and normal operations will continue there.

CANCELLATION OF CLASSES, SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 15, 1984: The Chairman of Senate has authorized that all formal classes normally scheduled to meet on the York campus on Saturday, September 15, be cancelled. These cancellations affect the Faculty of Arts, Atkinson College, the Centre for Continuing Education and the Writing Workshops. The following is a listing of specific groups affected: Atkinson College -- Administrative Studies; Mathematics; Natural Science; Psychology; Writing Workshop; Arts -- Computer Science; Economics; Writing Workshop; Centre for Continuing Education.

RESTRICTIONS ON NORMAL OPERATIONS, FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 14, 1984: As announced in the May 3rd York Bulletin, there will be some special parking controls instituted during Friday, September 14 to guard against unauthorized use of University parking lots. Specifically, starting at 12:00 noon on Friday, all six entrances to the University will be under tight control. Decals will be honoured. As of 12:00 midnight on Friday, both ends of the Murray Ross Parkway and Shoreham Drive will be closed and these roads will become additional entrances to controlled parking lots. The entrances will remain controlled until 7:00 p.m. on Saturday, September 15.

In addition, Departments were asked at that time to limit student use of facilities on Friday afternoon and Friday evening. This refers to voluntary and invitation events. THERE IS NO GENERAL CLOSING of the University on Friday, September 14. Class meetings and all other official University business will not be altered on Friday the 14th up to 5:00 p.m.

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 15, 1984: With the exception of certain 'essential services' related to serving campus residents and live experiment systems, all University offices and agencies should plan to be shut on Saturday, September 15. The casual use of the University facilities should be discouraged as much as possible. Due to the very heavy demand on all existing roads and parking areas, entry to the campus will be extremely difficult.

LIBRARY SERVICES: All libraries on the York campus will provide limited service only on the afternoon and evening of Friday, September 14, 1984. All libraries on the York campus will be closed all day on Saturday, September 15.

ESSENTIAL SERVICES: Special parking permits will be issued by the Conference Centre (Winters College, telephone local -3098) to those who must come to the campus on September 15. These permits will provide those responsible for essential services some speedier service at the entrances of the campus. The small double letter lots behind Osgoode, Administrative Studies, by Farquharson, by Atkinson College and Tait McKenzie will not be used for visitor parking but are reserved for essential service employees. Managers are asked to send the names of these employees to the Conference Centre immediately so that the special permits may be issued.

ON-CAMPUS RESIDENTS: The Housing Office will inform all on-campus residents of the services that will remain available to them during this period. All are being advised that coming and going from the campus on the 15th will be extremely difficult and neighbouring municipal streets will be very congested. No vehicles will be permitted to travel south of Finch Avenue after midnight on Friday, September 14.

The last day on which it will be possible to process change of listing forms/departmental listing sheets for inclusion in the 1984-85 directory is September 30, 1984. After this date, any deletions, additions or changes should continue to be submitted to the University Switchboard in order that the files may be updated accordingly.

YORK CAMPUS

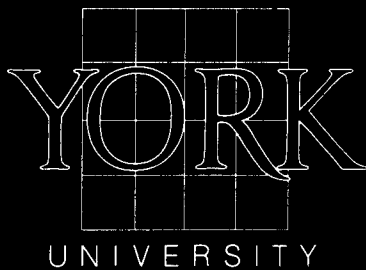
All classes are cancelled at 3:00 p.m.; all University offices and libraries will close at 2:00 p.m.
