

UNIVERSITY STATEMENT ON NEGOTIATIONS WITH YUSA

Mediation of the current contract negotiations between YUSA and the University will take place on Tuesday, October 9, 1984. The objective of the University, going into the mediation, is to reach a settlement with YUSA. To date it has not been possible to do so, because of the number and nature of the issues separating the parties.

At the outset of negotiations in June, YUSA presented the University with proposed amendments to nearly every clause of the 1983-84 Collective Agreement. Some of these matters were settled over the summer, but a great many of them, including a proposal for salary increments of 15% or \$3,000, whichever is greater, were still outstanding when the negotiations went into Ministry of Labour conciliation on September 12, 1984. At conciliation, YUSA made little change in its many demands, other than a reduction in its salary increment position to 12.5% or \$2,500. Still on the table are a very large number of proposals from YUSA, including:

- termination of probationary employees only for "just cause" (i.e., negation of the notion of "probation");
- priority for existing employees on a seniority basis, regardless of qualifications, for ALL job vacancies in the YUSA unit, with on-the-job training for those not yet qualified for the job for which they apply;
- lengthy notice to and consultation with the union prior to the introduction of any technological change, including any relocation of department.
- Union veto over any technological changes pending union satisfaction as to relocation of any employees affected;
- increase in vacations to 5 weeks at 15 years of service;
- unlimited unused sick leave and vacation credit payouts at retirement;
- lengthy lay-off notice requirements, followed by full bumping rights and re-training provisions;
- up to four hours off with pay per week for Daycare co-op duties;
- up to four hours off with pay per week for attending classes;
- up to three weeks paid paternity leave.

The University is prepared to move its position on salaries to deliver as much as it can to YUSA, consistent with the Board of Governors' budget guidelines for 1984-85 and the constraint created by the province's Inflation Restraint guidelines. There are also a number of the non-monetary areas where the University agrees with YUSA that improvements can be made; the University has made proposals already, and is in a position to amplify them in mediation. So far, the great many YUSA demands, and the unrealistic nature of many of them, has produced a context in which it has been difficult for the negotiating committees to hammer out reasonable, workable, and mutually beneficial solutions to those items which are agreed to be common problems. The University hopes that the mediation sessions next Tuesday will produce a concerted effort to get to grips with the main problems and result in contract amendments acceptable to the YUSA members.

IN THE EVENT OF A STRIKE

In the unhappy event that mediation proves unsuccessful, and that strike action follows, the University intends to continue to operate, although it will obviously be necessary to reduce many services. Employees in the YUSA bargaining unit who continue to perform their normal duties will continue to be paid; those who fail to perform their normal duties will not be paid.

Employees not in the YUSA bargaining unit are expected to carry out their duties as usual. York unions other than YUSA have been informed that the University intends to continue operations if YUSA strikes, and that the University expects collective agreements to be honoured. Individuals not in the striking union who fail to perform their normal duties, including the meeting of scheduled classes at the normal times and places, will not be paid, and will be subject to possible disciplinary action.

PICKET LINE RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

It is well established in Ontario that forming a picket line during the time a Union is in a legal strike situation is not itself illegal, nor is it illegal to communicate information or for a member of a picket line to use peaceful persuasion on an employee about to enter the premises being picketed.

On the other hand, it is <u>not</u> illegal for members of a striking bargaining unit to cross a picket line, and <u>is</u> a legal offence for pickets to use force, threats, or threatening gestures to block access to premises, to conduct themselves in such a way as to constitute a nuisance at law or an unlawful assembly, to trespass, to interfere by force with employees who wish to work, or to use threats or moral pressure amounting to compulsion. Mass picketing which has the effect of preventing students or employees from entering the University or prevents free passage of cars, trucks or goods in or out, similarly constitutes illegal picketing. The University does not intend to allow any picketing on the campus itself, and will insist that it be limited to the periphery.

In summary, then, pickets are legally permitted to do certain things. They may carry signs stating the nature of the dispute. They may ask you to honour their picket line but they have no right to threaten you either verbally or physically to enforce that request. They are supposed to keep moving and the Union is not allowed to place so many strikers in front of an entrance to the campus that free passage in and out by non-striking staff is prevented.

All reasonable steps must be taken to avoid violence or other incidents on the picket line; the University will arrange for police surveillance of the picket lines to the extent necessary. In the event that entrance to the campus is prevented, employees other than those in the YUSA bargaining unit should inform their Supervisor or Department Head/Chairperson by telephone that they are unable to report to work.

It is the University's hope that these notices will prove redundant, and that negotiations will be concluded successfully next week.

The Y.U.F.A. membership has now ratified the negotiated settlement previously approved Since the Toronto press has inaccurately reported the by York's Board of Governors. contents of the agreement the following summary has been prepared for the York community.

The Y.U.F.A. settlement is for 12 months, May 1, 1984 to April 30, 1985. It includes salary increments for most Y.U.F.A. bargaining unit members of:

3.0% across-the-board, EFFECTIVE MAY 1, 1984.

2.5% Career Progress Increment (in \$1,108 lump sum per person),
EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 1984.

1.0% Merit pool, for distribution EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 1985.

Full-time faculty overload rates were increased 5%, effective September 1, 19 administrative stipends will be increased 5% overall, effective July 1, 1984.

A professional expenses allowance of \$350 per person was also introduced. In the benefits area, private room hospitalization coverage will be added to the Extended Health Care Plan, and the Dental Plan will move to the 1984 Ontario Dental Association rate schedule, effective October 1, 1984, and to the 1985 ODA schedule once it is announced. Improvements to the York Pension Plan's guaranteed minimum pension and amendments to the Plan's "inflation protection" provisions were also agreed upon.

The staggered implementation dates on the Career Progress and Merit increment components of the salary increases permit the Y.U.F.A. settlement to be handled within the 6% amount budgeted by York's Board of Governors for 1984-85 compensation increments at York. There will be an increased forward cost impact into 1985-86.

In terms of the rules for calculating increment cost established by the province's Inflation Restraint Board, the phased implementation would result in an "IRB costing" of just above the 5% maximum guideline established by the IRB, at least as of the date of the settlement between Y.U.F.A. and the Board of Governors. Subsequent to that date, the IRB changed its Under the changed reporting guideline, the Y.U.F.A. own regulations with retroactive impact. settlement will cost at almost exactly 6%.

Within 30 days of ratification, full details of the agreement must be submitted to the IRB, with detailed costing data to be provided in an IRB-determined format. If the IRB does not question the data, the settlement may be implemented 15 working days following its submission. IRB does not have power to roll back a settlement, but does have power under the law to delay implementation until it is satisfied with the documentation provided to it.



Negotiations between the York University Staff Association and the University administration broke off last night when YUSA negotiators left the mediation session, refusing to receive and consider amended proposals which the University's Negotiating Committee had presented to the provincial mediator.

Late on October 9th, the union identified 5 major areas of concern to it, including salaries. The administration subsequently gave the mediator specific new proposals on two of these, including a compensation offer of 5.5% plus improved Dental benefits previously offered, and expanded proposals on technological change, along with a firm commitment to provide within the hour amended contract language on the other three of the union's priority concerns. The union would not receive any of these proposals.

The administration is prepared to continue the mediation at any time, to conclude the process of nesotiatins a new Asreement.



I am writing to you with regard to the October 25, 1984 York University payroll. In view of the commencement of strike action by CUEW on October 18, 1984, all members of CUEW bargaining units #1 and #2 will be paid in October an amount equal to 17/31 of their normal monthly salary. The same convention will be followed with respect to the grant-in-aid portion of Teaching Assistantship payments in Unit 1, and to any other non-CUEW unit York salary or support payments being made in October to members of either CUEW unit. Necessary adjustments to these other payments will be made as soon as possible.

The requirement to effect bank transfer of the monthly salary some days in advance of the 25th has necessitated this decision to pay CUEW unit members, in the first instance, only for that portion of the month prior to the strike. Assuming that the strike is settled prior to the end of October, a subsequent pay adjustment will be made by November 12, 1984 in order to provide pay for any post-strike days in October.

Regrettably, since we did not know at the time of making the salary transfers which members of the CUEW units are striking and which of them have exercised their right to continue to perform their normal duties, it was necessary to apply the salary reduction to all members of the two bargaining units. However, upon certification by you to the Office of the Dean of the Faculty in which your teaching appointment(s) is/are held that you have not been striking and will continue to perform your duties as usual, the Dean shall authorize the Payroll Office to release a cheque for the balance of your October pay. Please provide this information to the Dean's Office by November 5, 1984. It will be necessary for you personally to visit the Dean's Office (please see attached) to complete the required documentation. Individuals holding appointments in two Faculties will have to visit both Deans' Offices.

We regret that we have had to proceed in this fashion in order to implement the decisions of the University's Policy Committee and Board of Governors that those withdrawing their services not receive pay, and we apologize for this and other inconveniences created by the CUEW strike.
