GENERAL

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SAFEGUARDING OF YORK UNIVERSITY KEYS: The Department of Security and Safety Service wishes to remind faculty and staff members of the importance of taking special care to prevent keys from falling into the hands of unauthorized persons, thus exposing the property of the University and the personal property of faculty and staff members to theft or unauthorized use. When not being used, keys should be left in a safe place, preferably one which can be locked up and should not be left in locks, on tops of desks, in unsecured envelopes under blotters or similar places.

In the event that keys are lost, the pertinent information should be reported immediately to Special Services Unit of the Department of Security and Safety Service, Room 44, East Office Building in writing. The Special Services Unit will be responsible for investigation of loss, arranging replacement keys or, if necessary, having locks changed.

Keys which are found should be turned over to the Department of Security and Safety Service or to the nearest Security Officer.
