

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#### GOVERNMENT FUNDING AVAILABLE FOR STUDENT EMPLOYMENT

The attention of the University community is called to the following list of government-funded job opportunities in the hope that various areas of the University might create summer employment openings for our students during the summer of 1985. As well, individuals and groups in the University might consider bringing such possibilities to the attention of outside employers -- municipalities, institutions, and private companies -- with an eye to encouraging the hiring of York students.

Individuals and organizations interested in pursuing these programs should be aware that an emphasis tends to be placed on those job proposals which provide participants with skills and experience for which there is a ready application in the labor market. In that regard, these programs should not generally be viewed as supplements to assistance provided by research funding agencies. Some programs also place an emphasis on a project which benefits the community at large.

#### Summer Employment Experience Development (Federal)

Funding

50% wage subsidy to a maximum of \$3.00 per hour for the private sector. 75% subsidy of the provincial minimum wage for government funded institutions. Eligible Jobs

-A new job which relates to a course of study and/or which will provide practical work experience benefiting a student's future employability. The duration must be between 6-18 weeks, not to exceed 40 hours per week. Eligible Employees

-Students who intend to return to full-time studies in the fall.

Application Period

-The 1985 deadline is March 29.

#### Ontario Youth Employment Program (Provincial)

#### Funding

-Provides a subsidy of \$1.25 per hour, paid to employer, to a maximum 40 hour week.

Eligible Jobs -Applies to new positions created for a duration of 8-20 weeks. This is a work experience program offering full-time summer employment.

Eligible Employees

-Students returning to their studies in the fall, must be between 15 and 24 years of age.
