Effective July 1, 1985, a Temporary Provincial Surtax was introduced on Federal base tax as follows: 5% on individuals paying a Federal base tax between \$6,000 - \$15,000; 10% on Federal base tax in excess of \$15,000; and this surtax is not subject to deduction at source for 1985. Federal base tax is only determined when your income tax return is filed. Refer to the Tax Tables in the 1984 "General Tax Guide for Ontario Residents" booklet received with your tax forms to determine any impact. Financial Aid Office begins disbursement of O.S.A.P. documents for students who have received their "Notice of Assessment".

**Friday, August 30:**

- \* Last day to pay fees by uncertified cheque whether in person or by mail.

**Tuesday, September 3:**

From this date all fee payments must be made by cash, certified cheque, or money order (whether by mail or in person).

**Friday, September 6:**

Last day to pay fees without Late Service Charge.

**Friday, September 27:**

Last day to drop Fall/Winter Full and Fall Half Courses without financial penalty (excluding Atkinson College courses).

**Friday, October 4:**

- \* Last day for enrolled students to pay fees, with Late Service Charge, i.e. to register.

## NEW TELECOMMUNICATIONS NETWORK FOR YORK

On Monday, June 10, 1985, the Board of Governors approved the purchase of a new Telecommunications System that will see York with its own state-of-the-art telephone exchange and vastly expanded and enhanced communications services.

The Telecommunications Task Force wishes to advise the York community that, as the first phase of the implementation of the system, the new Leonard G. Lumbers Building and the Department of Computing Services have been equipped with the new telephones. Members of the community wishing to contact anyone located in the new building or in the Department of Computing Services must call 9-665-8585 instead of the numbers currently listed in the York Handbook. Your call will be answered by the main University switchboard and connected to the appropriate extension number. A Directory Supplement to the York Handbook has been issued listing all the people and departments affected along with their extension numbers and locations.

Evening Reserved Parking, Regulation Changes: Changes to the parking regulations in order to increase access to internal parking spaces for evening students have been approved by the Presidential Advisory Committee on Parking. Permits for external lots are now honored in internal lots from Friday at 5:00 p.m. to Monday at 8:00 a.m. To free spaces in internal lots during the week for evening students with reserved permits, the external permit is changed to eliminate internal parking after 5:00 p.m. Special evening internal parking permits will be issued, however, to staff and graduate students who have an external permit and whose duties require them to attend University buildings between 5:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m., Monday to Thursday (gate controlled lots AA, JJ and HH are exempted). This 1985-86 pass is available free of charge. To obtain a pass, applicants must fill out and bring to the Parking Office a special authorization form which has been circulated to faculties and departments on campus. Educational Leaves/Call For Applications: The 1985-86 Collective Agreement between the Board of Governors of York University and the York University Faculty Association continues the provisions for educational leaves that were established in the 1983-84 Agreement. Under the terms of the Agreement, a Committee on Educational Leaves is charged to solicit and decide upon applications for educational leaves from full-time faculty and professional librarians. The purpose of the Educational Leaves program is to provide "opportunities for probationary or tenured/continuing appointment employees to take educational leaves for approved plans of study for purposes to include, but not to be limited to, attainment of a higher level of professional flexibility and better qualifications for internal transfer." Forms of professional development in which the foreseeable measurable benefit will be principally to the individual also fall within the ambit of the educational leaves clauses. Nature of the Awards: The Committee awards teaching release-time normally to an aggregate maximum of nine Course Director equivalents. Applicants may apply for leave for an entire academic year or a portion thereof. Applications for leave spread over more than one year may also be made. In its assessment of applications, the Educational Leaves Committee will apply the following criteria: timeliness, feasibility, and anticipated benefits to the institution and the individual. Procedures: Applicants for educational leave must submit the following information: (1) A proposal in the form of a letter of statement, complete with a rationale that addresses at least the questions of timeliness, feasibility and anticipated benefits and any other matters that the applicant considers relevant to his/her case. (2) Two letters of reference or support. The Committee will routinely solicit comments or applications from Chairpersons or equivalents and/or Deans. All letters of assessment are open to applicants. The deadline for submission of applications is September 30, 1985. The Committee intends to assess applications and inform applicants of a decision as soon after that date as possible.
