The Way For All

The United Way campaign at York will be extended this year to November 15. Last year about 6% of York employees gave approximately \$40,000. Our hope is to increase this rate of participation, rather than to encourage a few people to give large amounts of money. This year, by October 25, 93 people had contributed approximately \$14,000. Question: How are funds distributed to agencies in the community?

Answer: The central feature of funds allocation is a process called "citizen review" unique to United Way. Volunteers serve on United Way Planning and Allocations Committees. They assess changes in community needs, anticipate future needs for services and programs, consider proposals for new programs, study the agencies' annual budgets and audits, determine the United Way funds required and recommend the amount of United Way financial support for each agency. This makes the United Way accountable to the general community and all decisions are public.

GENERAL

Subject - Safeguarding of York University Keys

The Department of Security and Safety Services wishes to remind faculty and staff members of the importance of taking special care to prevent keys from falling into the hands of unauthorized persons, thus exposing the property of the University and the personal property of faculty and staff members to theft or unauthorized use.

When not being used, keys should be left in a safe place, preferably one which can be locked up and should not be left in locks, on tops of desks, in unsecured envelopes under blotters or similar places.

In the event that keys are lost, the pertinent information should be reported immediately to Special Services Unit of the Department of Security and Safety Service (Room 44, East Office Building) in writing. The Special Services Unit will be responsible for investigation of loss, arranging replacement of keys or, if necessary, having locks changed.

Keys which are found should be turned over to the Department of Security and Safety Service or to the nearest Security Officer.

Keys should not be lent to other persons by the authorized custodians. If additional keys are required these may be requested in writing from the Security and Safety Service.

Any obsolete keys which were left over by former office or room occupants for desks, filing cabinets, should be returned to the Locksmith's Shop located in Room 135, Physical Plant Workshops.

Question: If I object to an agency funded by the United Way, can I withhold my pledge from one place?

Answer: Yes. The method available is by designating your contribution towards an agency you do support. Simply write the name of the agency directly on your pledge card.

Question: What about tax receipts?

Answer: If you make a single contribution to the United Way now, an official tax receipt will be forwarded to you after December 31, 1985, via the Community Relations Office. If you choose payroll deduction, a tax acknowledgement will show up on your T4 for the appropriate tax year.

Planned Shutdown of Utilities: To permit overhaul of high voltage transformer stations in Steacie and Farquharson Buildings, power will be shut off at 9:00 p.m. on Saturday, November 9 and will be turned on at 5:00 a.m. on Sunday, November 10. Farquharson will be supplied with emergency power from Lumbers Building to energize critical equipment. A 15-minute power interruption will be required to connect the emergency power supply in Farquharson, and a further 15-minute interruption will be required to disconnect the emergency power supply when the work is complete. In addition, two momentary power interruptions of approximately one minute in duration will occur to permit transfer of power from one feeder to another. Momentary power transfers will begin at approximately 1:00 a.m. and again at 4:00 a.m. on Sunday, November 10. The buildings affected are: Founders College and Residence, Vanier College and Residence, Winters College and Residence, Stong College and Residence, KNIMR Building, Lumbers Building, McLaughlin College and Residence, Petrie Science Building, Tait McKenzie Building, Bethune College and Residence.

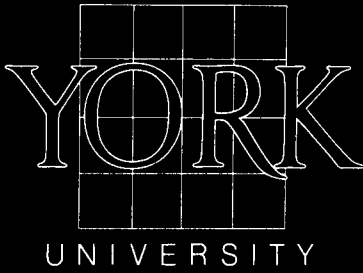
