The Department of Security and Safety Services advises members of the York community that the following precautions should be taken when installing <u>Christmas trees</u> and appropriate decorative materials: select a tree with fresh firm needles, support firmly, stand in water and top up as required; locate away from sources of heat and from exits and exit routes; do not smoke near tree; no open flame devices such as candles, etc. should be used on or near the tree; check all lighting sets for wear and tear before installing (repair or replace as necessary); use only indirect lighting for metal trees as shorts in lighting sets could cause a tree to become electrically energized; use only fire retardent treated materials for decorative purposes; and promptly dispose of all excess paper and wrappings.
