WEATHER EMERGENCY PROCEDURES: On occasion, information received from various sources such as government weather services, the Ministry of Transport, the police services, the Canadian Automobile Association and the Toronto Transit Commission will indicate that weather and driving conditions are hazardous. In the interests of public safety, the University will adopt weather emergency procedures as outlined below. The decision to adopt weather emergency procedures and cancel classes is the responsibility of the President and the Chairman of Senate.

When a decision is made to adopt weather emergency procedures during regular office hours, the Department of Security and Safety will notify designated University representatives who will announce to members of their Faculty/College and administrative departments that classes will be cancelled at a specific time. An announcement will be made as soon as possible after the decision has been reached, over the following radio stations:

When a decision is made to adopt weather emergency procedures before the University commences operation in the morning, the Department of Security and Safety will inform designated University representatives as well as the Emergency Services Centre and the York University switchboard. An announcement will be made on the above noted radio stations as soon as possible after 7:00 a.m.

When a decision has been made to return to normal operating procedures, the University's Emergency Services Centre and switchboard will be made aware of the return to normal operating procedures and the radio stations will be asked to broadcast an announcement that the University will resume operations at a stated time.

When weather emergency services are adopted by the University, certain service departments are required to continue to operate under special emergency operating procedures. The essential services are: Security and Safety Services, Department of Physical Plant (outside services section, utilities section, university switchboard, Emergency Services Centre) and Computer Operations.

ASBESTOS REMOVAL FROM OSGOODE HALL LAW SCHOOL: Phase I of the asbestos removal from Osgoode Hall Law School commenced Friday, December 20, 1985 and continues through Monday, January 13, 1986. Members of the York community are asked to note the following information:

Access to Building: The asbestos removal began Friday, December 20, 1985 after work hours. A security guard will be posted at the west receiving area until Monday, January 13 when the work will be completed. Security is being provided to monitor the whereabouts of people who wish to enter the building where it is safe to enter (areas where work is being done will be roped off). The air on the ground floor will be safe, in asbestos hazard terms, for the duration of the removal project but will not be ventilated until January 6. The air in the offices above will also be safe but will not be ventilated until January 13.

Relocation of Osgoode Staff: Osgoode will relocate core staff from key administrative offices, including a number of faculty secretaries, to the 5th floor of the Scott Library. Osgoode Library staff will be employed in the main library. All other Osgoode staff will take on assignments in other campus offices during this period unless they elect to take vacation leave or leave without pay from January 2 to January 10.

Communication with the Osgoode Community: An information meeting was held December 5, 1985 for members of the Osgoode community to discuss testing and monitoring of air quality during and after the asbestos removal.

Weather Emergencies Procedures: A revised Weather Emergencies policy has been developed and copies (with a telephone calling list) are being sent to senior members of faculty and staff who are directly concerned in the decision-making process and in phoning the decision to their departments. Copies of each document will be issued to all P&M staff at a future date for insertion in the new P&M Handbook. In the interim, those P&M who have an immediate need for their own copy may pick one up from the Reading Room, Department of Personnel Services, Suite A, East Office Building.
