

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<u>OBITUARY</u>: John Stewart Proctor, who served on York's Board of Governors since its creation in 1959, died February 1. Mr. Proctor headed the Board's Property and Building Committee for 20 years. He chaired the Board of Governors from 1979 to 1982, then assumed the role of Chancellor from June 1982 to August 1983. He was named the first honorary member of the Board in 1984. He received an honorary degree from York in 1977.
