GOVERNMENT FUNDING AVAILABLE FOR STUDENT EMPLOYMENT

The attention of the University community is called to the following list of government-funded job opportunities in the hope that various areas of the University might create summer employment openings for our students during the summer of 1986. As well, individuals and groups in the University might consider bringing such possibilities to the attention of outside employers--municipalities, institutions, and private companies--with an eye to encouraging the hiring of York students.

Individuals and organizations interested in pursuing these programs should be aware that an emphasis tends to be placed on those job proposals which provide participants with skills and experience for which there is a ready application in the labor market. In this regard, these programs should not generally be viewed as supplements to assistance provided by research funding agencies. Some programs also place an emphasis on a project which benefits the community at large.

Summer Employment/Experience Development (Federal)

Summer Employment/Experience Development will provide wage subsidies to private, Municipal non-profit sectors to create additional openings for students to undertake work that clearly relates to their course of studies or career plans.

Ontario Youth Employment Program (Provincial)

The Ontario Youth Program (OYEP) is being continued in 1986 to create job opportunities for unemployed youth age 15 to 24. The program is designed to benefit both young people and employers by:

- creating new full-time job opportunities for young people
- providing young people with valuable work experience, skills, contacts and references that will better prepare them for permanent participation in the labour force.

The programs run from April 14 to October 18, 1986

A subsidy of \$1.25/per hour will be paid to approved employers who create new jobs. Jobs must last between 8 to 20 weeks, with between 25 to 40 hours of work per week.

The program is available to business and non-profit organizations which have been in operation for at least one year.
