The Telecommunications Office would like to provide further information to the York community regarding the automatic attendant answering service at the main switchboard, which went into operation on October 20. When callers dial 736-2100 they hear a recording which explains how to dial through to an individual extension number, using a touch-tone telephone. It is not necessary for them to listen to the complete message before proceeding. To override the message, you must press 1, then enter the four digit extension number you wish to reach and press the number symbol (#) to the right of the zero twice. When calling from a rotary dial telephone they only have to wait a few seconds for an operator to serve them. It is requested that these instructions be given to callers, in particular those calling long distance, to allow them quicker access. For further information call Telecommunications at -2667.
