

ROLM CBX-II COMMUNICATION SYSTEM REVIEW

In the spring of 1987, York Computing Services will conduct a complete review of the configuration of the ROLM CBX-II Communication System, which was cutover this past summer.

The main purpose of the review is to identify modifications to the original configuration of the system which are needed in order to make it more functional for the University community of phone users. Essentially, this is a fine-tuning exercise which is now possible because the users have had over six months to become accustomed to the system and its features. It is expected that most of the modifications will only involve software changes in the application of features. For instance, a unit may wish to change the pick groups or the system forwarding options for its phones. Both voice and data configurations will be reviewed.

There will be no charges to the units of the University for this reconfiguration, provided that the modifications do not involve the provision of new equipment (e.g., the addition of a phone or a DCM), the modification of existing equipment (e.g., the relocation of a phone), or the provision of new facilities (e.g., the provision of a Direct-In-Dial number).

YCS invites all users to report problems they have encountered with their ROLM CBX-II voice and data configurations and features. Suggestions for improving the service will be welcome and will be implemented if possible. Problem reports and suggestions may be sent in writing to the user's unit phone designate or directly to the Manager of Telecommunications (016B Steacie). Telecommunications staff will contact the designates to schedule meetings to review configurations.

ROLM CBX-II

ATTENDANT ANSWERING SERVICE

In October, 1986, Telecommunications installed for a 60 day trial period, an automatic attendant answering service to relieve congestion on the University's main switchboard and to improve response time in answering incoming calls.

The overall response to the system by both internal and external users has been very favourable.

The service was closely monitored during the sixty day trial period and during the first week of operation, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m., 20 percent or 800 calls per day that reached the recorded message did not go through switchboard. During the last two weeks of the study, 30% or 1,200 of the total calls to the University (4,000 calls per day) were processed by the attendant answering service.

The response time of the calls being processed to the University switchboard consoles was cut by less than half. Before the new system was installed the response time was in some instances in excess of 20 seconds. Calls are now answered within 7-10 seconds once processed to a switchboard position.

After reviewing the data on the trial period the Communications Administrative Committee has approved the purchase of the system.

DIRECT-IN-DIAL POLICY

The Communications Administrative Committee has approved a change in policy concerning the provision of Direct-In-Dial (DID) phone numbers. The DID number allows a caller from outside of the University's campuses to call directly to a particular York telephone without going through the automatic Attendant Answering Service, the switchboard operators, or any other receptionist. According to the new policy, any user who wishes a DID phone number may obtain this number simply by requesting it from Telecommunications. The user or his/her unit must pay the initial installation charge (\$60.00), the Administration charge (\$15.00), and the monthly charge for the DID (\$7.00/month). However, no additional approval is necessary.
