Members of the York community are asked to note the following temporary **changes to bus routes** as a result of the construction on Steeles Avenue: **Route 41** will continue northbound on Keele St. to York Blvd., proceed west on York Blvd., loop through the Common and then continue east on York Blvd. It will then proceed north on Keele St. to Steeles Ave. E., turning southbound on Petrolia and continue to Canarctic, turning west on Canarctic to southbound Keele St. **Route 60** during rush hour, runs every 7-8 minutes otherwise every 30 minutes.
