Obituary: dian marino, Associate Professor in the Faculty of Environmental Studies, died on January 2. dian was also a community-based artist and activist who came to York as a student, receiving her Master of Environmental Studies in 1974. She had been teaching at York since 1984. A scholarship in Environmental Studies is being established for anyone wishing to make a donation in dian's memory. In the November Special Bulletin announcing the Provincial government's funding decision, reference was made to the significant and fundamental changes being made to the Ontario Student Assistance Programme. It is important that the details and implications of this announcement are made clear to the York community.

On November 26, 1992 Minister of Colleges and Universities Richard Allen announced the virtual abolition of grants for Ontario students. As of 1993/94, the \$241 million dollar grants program will be cut by \$230 million. The remaining \$11 million will provide bursaries for specific groups, including students with disabilities, sole-support parents, and married students with child-care costs. The government announced an increase to the loans program of \$130 million and provisions for debt relief.

Eliminating the grants program means that more students will be faced with a higher average debtload. The Ministry of Colleges and Universities admits that the average debtload for graduates of three-year programs will rise to \$15,825 from today's level of \$9,450. Studies have shown that the prospect of an increasing debtload are a disincentive at best, and a distinct barrier to accessibility at worst.

York students will be hit hard by this fundamental shift in government policy. According to a survey of York undergraduates undertaken in 1991 for the VP (Institutional Affairs), 18% of York undergraduates rely on student assistance to fund their education (in 1991 this meant nearly 7,000 students). An estimated 12% receive a loan and an estimated 6% receive a grant. Only about 36% of students at York receive any financial support from their parents. An estimated 69% work an average of 26 hours per week to pay for their university education.

The government also announced a pilot project to test the feasibility of introducing a tuition Income Contingent Repayment Plan (ICRP). Although the details are still unclear, and there has been no announcement regarding the involvement of stakeholders in working out the specifics of the plan, it is expected that the plan will be tested on one thousand Ontario students.

Dr. Allen has indicated to the Ontario Federation of Students that more details will be available this month.

The York Federation of Students, which has serious reservations about the impact of ICRP on accessibility, is planning to facilitate an ICRP workshop with York administrative and academic heads in the near future.

According to Dr. Allen, there are more changes planned to student assistance in Ontario. The province has still not introduced any of the recommendations made by their OSAP Review Board of last year.
