YORK UNIVERSITY WELCOMES PROVINCE'S TRANSIT ANNOUNCEMENT

Today's announcement by the Ontario government to fund the extension of the Spadina subway to York University was described as "great news for York and the entire north-west sector of Metro," by York President Susan Mann.

"The line will make a tremendous difference to all of us and will make York a truly metropolitan university," Mann said. "We are delighted with the Premier's announcement and thank him for it."

Construction of the \$649 million, 5.2 km extension of the subway from Sheppard Ave. to York could begin as early as next year if it receives environmental assessment approvals from relevant government ministries. Completion is scheduled for 2002. The project is being funded by jobsOntario.

During the 10 years this project is under construction, it will create 12,000 full-time jobs. Approximately 130 of these jobs will be created this year.

"To say the Premier's announcement is welcome news would be understatement indeed," said William A. Dimma, Chair of York University Board of Governors. "Right now there are few things as important to the future of York University as the subway."

This new connection will provide rapid transit to and from a major traffic generator, namely York University.

"York is a major force in the provision of education in the Greater Toronto Area and a major player in the economic life of the community. The extension of the subway is a long awaited recognition of this fact," said Dimma.

The new line will provide a direct connection to the Barrie GO rail line at Finch Avenue, enhancing inter-regional transit. In addition, by attracting commuters and other travellers from northwest Metro Toronto and York Region, the line will build ridership on the Spadina subway line.


