YORK UNIVERSITY DISCONTINUES MEN'S AND WOMEN'S INTERUNIVERSITY GYMNASTICS TEAMS

York University, on the advice and recommendation of the Executive Committee (Athletics and Recreation) of the Department of Physical Education, Recreation and Athletics, has decided to discontinue the men's and women's interuniversity gymnastics teams at York University at the end of the 1992-93 competitive season.

The competitive excellence achieved by these two interuniversity teams over the past 25 years is recognized. The decision for discontinuation has been made only after lengthy, careful deliberation and ongoing consultation with the appropriate parties.

The Executive Committee (Athletics and Recreation) of the Department of Physical Education, Recreation and Athletics monitors the needs of the interuniversity athletic teams and recommends the continuation or discontinuation of individual interuniversity sports on the basis of sport team criteria and ongoing evaluation. This ongoing process has led to the discontinuation of several sports at York University in recent years, including men's wrestling, women's synchronized swimming, men's golf, men's and women's squash and men's curling.

The criteria used in reaching a decision include facilities, cost/benefit, competitive structure and feeder system.

The decision to discontinue the men's and women's interuniversity gymnastics teams was based on the above criteria.

Facility

York University has never been able to supply an adequate space for the ongoing operation of gymnastics. Unlike other interuniversity sports operated at York University, gymnastics requires a large dedicated space to house appropriately the large, heavy equipment and the nature of the physical movements required in the sport. Over time, the space provided on-campus proved to be inadequate from a safety perspective. In 1991 a decision was made to re-locate gymnastics to an off-campus rental site. At that time, the senior University administration indicated that it would not support this rental arrangement over the long-term and in September 1992, the owners of the facility were informed that the contractual arrangement would be terminated as of April 30, 1993.

Cost/Benefit

On the basis of cost per athlete, these teams are the most expensive offered by the Department. Despite a number of attempts and for a number of reasons, York has not been able to offset costs through income generated by community-oriented gymnastics clubs directed by the coaching staff on-campus or by other opportunities such as gymnastic seminars.

Competitive Structure

In the Ontario Universities Athletic Association (OUAA) and the Ontario Women's Intercollegiate Athletic Association (OWIAA), only 5 of a possible 17 universities compete. The Canadian Interuniversity Athletic Union (CIAU) chose to discontinue the national championships for men's and women's gymnastics in 1988. The CIAU decision was based on decreased university involvement.

Feeder System

The changing nature of formal physical activity programs within the secondary schools has resulted in a model where gymnastics has developed into a club-based sport for its competitive opportunities as opposed to a school-based sport.

Opportunities for elite competition in gymnastics exist within the club system and it has become increasingly difficult for universities to replicate this environment.

GENERAL:

THE SOCIAL CONTRACT AND YORK'S CURRENT LABOUR NEGOTIATIONS

On April 5th, the Premier called together representatives of Ontario's various public service employer and employee organizations, including organizations which receive significant transfer payments from the Government, for the purpose of proposing social contract bargaining. While it is too early to know exactly what this means, it seems that the Government wishes to have employer and employee groups in each sector get together voluntarily to discuss how best to reduce the burden of compensation costs.

The sectoral groups have not yet been defined, although a statement in this regard is expected to be made very soon by the Government's negotiating team led by the Deputy Minister of Health, Michael Decter. We anticipate that universities will be grouped in with colleges and schools.

The implication of this announcement for funding in 1993-94 is not yet clear; what is clear, however, is that the Government has seen its revenues decline significantly in the last two years and it is projecting a substantial increase in its deficit in 1993-94, perhaps as high as \$17 billion, if measures are not taken to keep the debt under control. It believes this would lead to a situation in which payment of debt interest would become the largest Government program, eclipsing even the education and health programs.

This circumstance casts a shadow of uncertainty across the financial assumptions underlying York's budget for next year. While this exists, it would be imprudent to enter into major new obligations. Since the objective of the Government is to find means for controlling the costs of compensation, it would be particularly imprudent for us to enter into new obligations in this area until more is known about the "sectoral bargaining" proposal and its consequences for university funding.

York University will be endeavouring to clarify the situation as soon as possible and to weigh the ramifications for the University of any developments which occur. In the meantime, we will be postponing discussions with employee groups about increments and changes to contract language which have financial costs associated with them. We will continue, of course, to discuss issues which do not involve costs. We look forward to a full resumption of negotiations on all matters, including cost items, as soon as the University's funding situation has been clarified.
